The school's behaviour policy has been revised to include compliance with social distancing and this has been communicated to staff, pupils and parents. Senior leaders monitor areas where there are breaches of social distancing measures and arrangements are reviewed. Messages to parents reinforce the importance of social distancing. Arrangements for social distancing of younger primary school children have been agreed and staff are clear on expectations. Individual risk assessments have been reviewed and updated for pupils with additional needs. Concerns have been discussed with parents and a plan agreed where required. 		Monitor updates to social distancing guidelines for schools through DfE and amend this accordingly Behaviour policy has been updated to reflect changes and revisions shared with staff electronically and during INSET day.
